Previous knowledge

These questions must be made to the students showing the cover and before reading the book:

- What is represented in the picture?
- Who are these people? What are they doing?
- Where is Egypt? What continent is it in?
- Do you think these children belong to this place? Why?

Segment 1 (page 1 to 9)

- Prediction (before reading)
 - How do you think they got to Egypt?
 - Do you think the dog is going there, too?
- Comprehension (while reading: remember/understand)
 - Did they read the book? Why?
 - What materials did they need to make the model?

Segment 1 (page 1 to 9)

- Response (after reading: apply/evaluate)
 - How would you feel if your pet or a classmate broke something yours? (apply)
 - Which model do you like the most? (evaluate)

Segment 2 (page 10 to 12)

- Prediction (before reading)
 - What do you think will happen next?
 - Do you think they will be happy there or not?
- Comprehension (while reading)
 - How many pyramids were there?
 - What were they made of?

Segment 2 (page 10 to 12)

- Response (after reading)
 - How do you think a pyramid was built?
 - Would you like to go inside a pyramid?

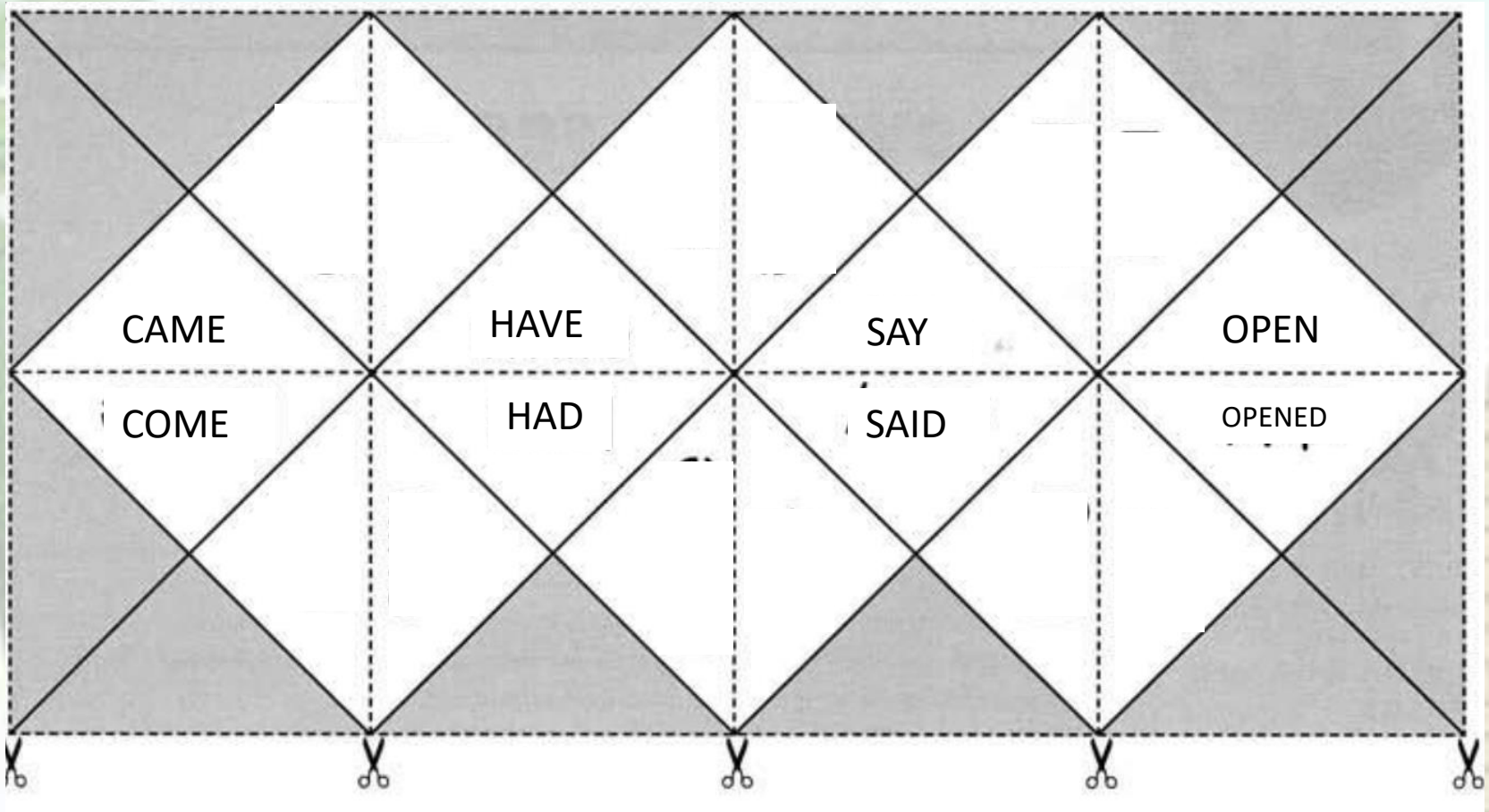
CREATE

ACTIVITIES

GRAMMAR

- Using IWB, the whole group will read again pages 1 to 4, looking for verbs in past simple.
- In pairs, classify these verbs into two lists: regular and irregular. Then, compare the list with another pair.
- Then, we give them a template of the jigsaw puzzle. They have to complete it writing the infinitive + past simple of the verbs from the list. When it is finished they cut it. And finally, they play to make the puzzle (see next slide for an example).

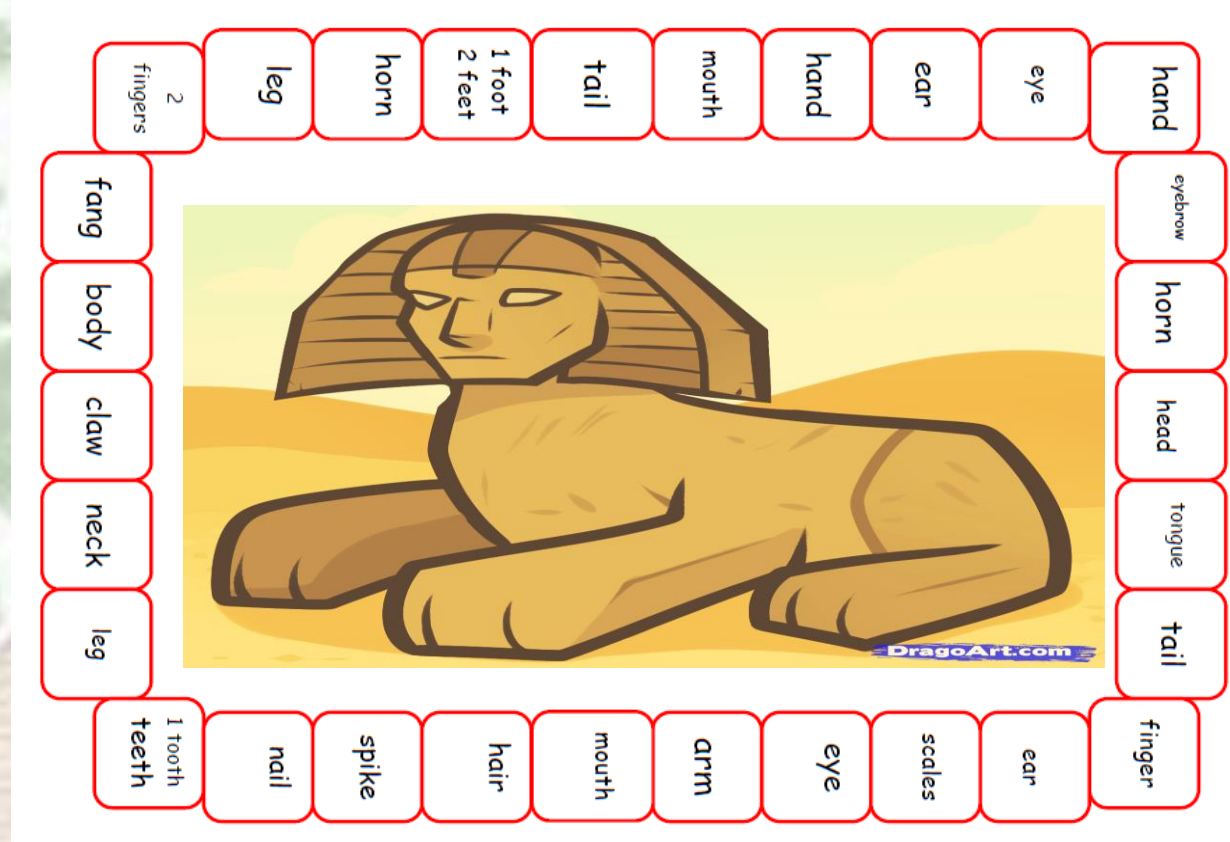
ACTIVITIES

VOCABULARY

Revision of parts of the body. Build a body. Draw a sphinx.

- First, we ask what a sphinx is and what parts it has.
- We give them a template of the vocabulary of the parts of a sphinx.
- They play the game in groups of four (see next slide for an example) of the game)
- After drawing their own sphinx, they present it to the class.

- Instead of hand, legs, body... we are going to write: spider head, lion's legs, zebra's body....

VOCABULARY

Egyptian picture dictionary

- We give the students a list of specific words, (from the text), related to Egypt: slaves, pharaoh, sphinx, place, pyramic, guard, block of stone, carving.
- Then we create the picture dictionary.

ACTIVITIES

Phonology

- From the verb list in the grammar activities, we are going to choose the regular verbs and classify them according to their ending sound (-ed).
- We choose *opened*, *pointed* and *asked* as a model example.
- We add other verbs in past tense in small papers so that they can classify them in three different list.
- Then they write sentences with verbs from the same list.
- Then they choose three and they play odd one out.

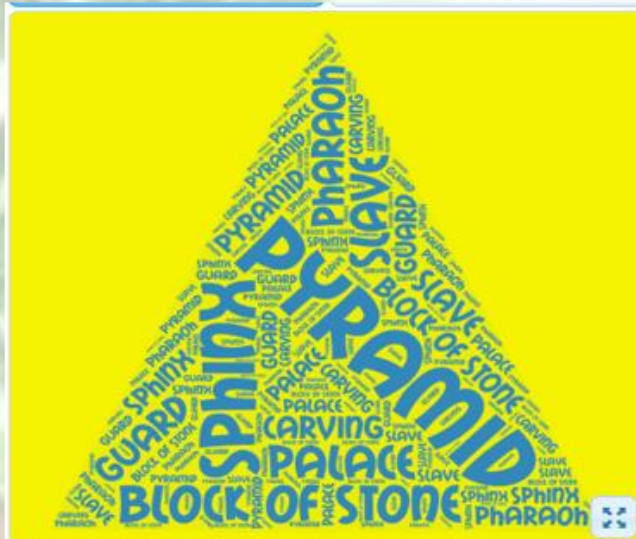

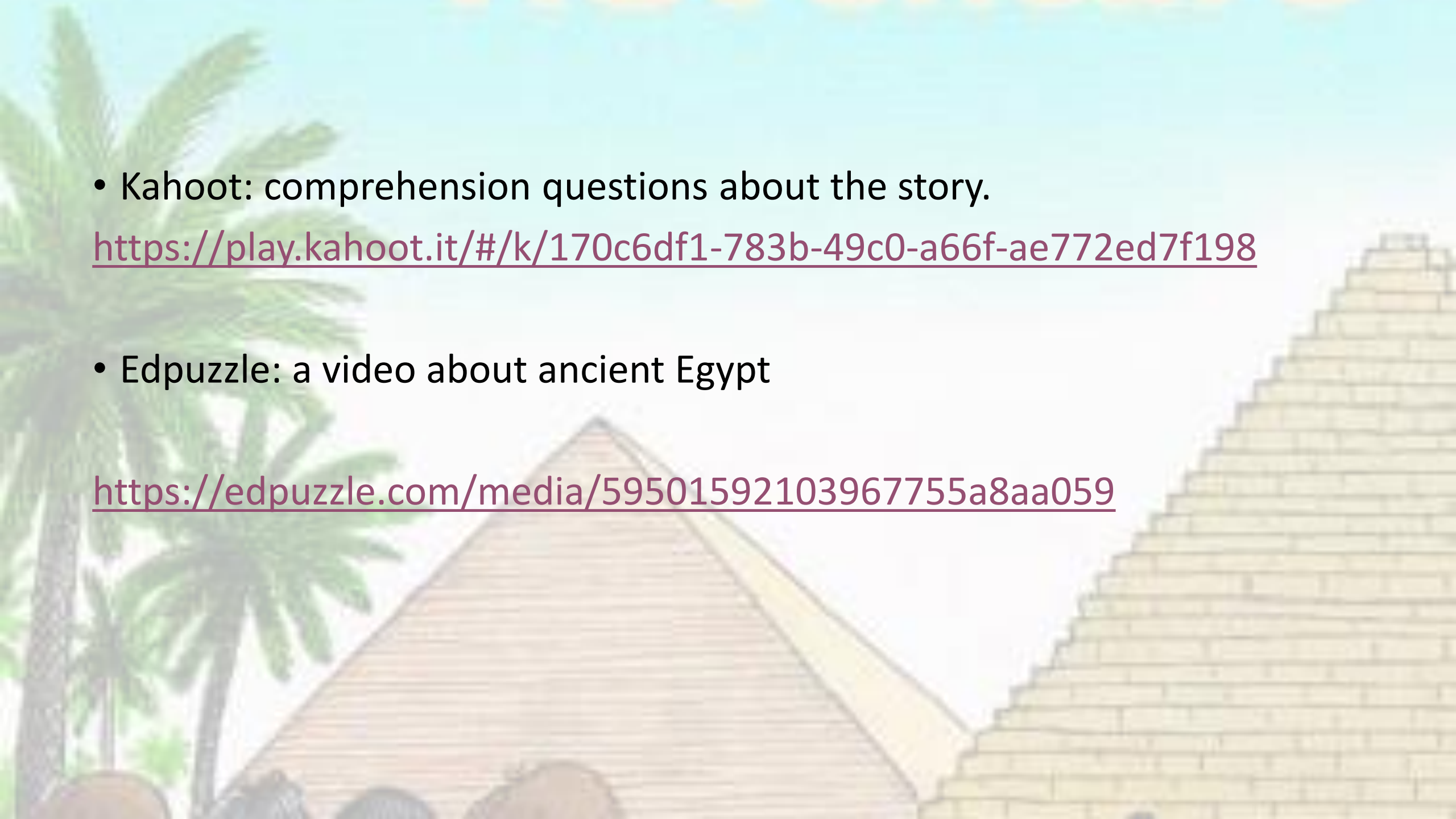
- Spelling City: to work on grammar. This list is made using some verbs from the story.
