# 1. Find the following words. What do you think they mean? Use a dictionary when necessary.

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#### 2. Find examples of the following literary devices:

Metaphor: good night / dying of light (=death), light (=life) Alliteration: In every stanza (not – night, go – good, through – their, deeds – danced, sang – sun, blind – blaze...) Repetition: "Do not go gentle into that good night.", "Rage, rage against the dying of the light." Oxymoron: good night (=good death, but death is not good); blinding sight Paradox: Curse, bless, me now with your fierce tears, I pray. (If he cursed him that would show that he still had the spirit to fight) Simile: "blind eyes could blaze like meteors"

- **3.** What is the narrator point of view? First and Sixth stanzas: 2<sup>nd</sup> person (the author talks to his father). The rest of them: 3<sup>rd</sup> person.
- 4. Write the rhyme scheme and the meter of the poem.

Rhyme scheme: A B A in the first five stanzas, A B A A in the last one. Meter: iambic pentameter
